Kerry has led the organisation with an unwavering commitment to delivering the highest quality palliative and end of life care, education and research. lives of patients and their families and ensuring that the Hospice's services are accessible to anyone who needs them.

Under her transformative leadership, the Hospice has flourished achieving an outstanding CQC rating (twice), ranking in the top tier of the best companies to work for, and becoming the world's first University Teaching Hospice.

Kerry has been an important part of the Hospice's history and we are grateful for all she has achieved. We wish her well for the future."

Kerry said: "St Gemma's means so much to me personally and professionally and it has truly been an honour and privilege to lead this amazing charity since 2010. Now feels like the right time for me to pursue other opportunities and for St Gemma's to appoint my replacement to lead the Hospice into the next chapter."

Growing our own

The gardens at the Hospice are truly spectacular and our amazing team of staff and volunteers work hard all year round to keep them looking their best. This year, thanks to local company S9 Communications, we have installed a new water feature as part of a new accessible garden and the vegetable patch planted last year is really coming into its own. This batch of rhubarb was harvested recently and gardener Nathan delivered it straight to our chefs, ready to be enjoyed by patients, visitors, staff and volunteers. Putting research into practice


St Gemma's was the first ever accredited University Teaching Hospice. The Hospice's Academic Unit of Palliative Care trains health professionals from across the city, runs in-person and online palliative care training courses for professionals, and carries out research, the results of which are used to improve patient care. Caroline works across the Hospice to train the clinical teams on any new developments. In this session she is working with nurses on the In-Patient Unit to bring them up to date on some latest techniques.

Sweet gestures

Liz worked at St Gemma's Hospice many years ago but this year she was referred to St Gemma's for end of life care. Liz said: "They aren't just supporting me - they are looking after my mum and dad, my brother, my husband and my beautiful sons with compassion, understanding and genuine kindness. It's not just the clinical teams, it's the whole team. We have been able to enjoy time in the beautiful gardens, we have sat in the Hospice Bistro and had amazing family Sunday roasts. The chef even baked me my favourite cake, which was just so thoughtful. These small acts of kindness go such a long way."

After several weeks at the Hospice, Liz died peacefully, surrounded by her family. She was 42 years old.





People think hospices are just a building where you go to spend your final days. They couldn't be more wrong. I have been admitted to their In-Patient Unit on four occasions now – and leave feeling revived.

The team there are first class - they provide skilled care and support around the clock. Last time I was there, I was too active to stay in bed. I love nature, so I spent hours in the gardens with the gardening team and picked up some new skills! I fed the fish in the pond and befriended a crow who would hop onto my patio every day at the same time. The chefs even cooked my favourite Caribbean food – it was just incredible, they do anything for you. It's like a 5-star hotel and you are treated as an individual.

Now I'm at home with my family and I have regular visits from my St Gemma's specialist nurse, Juliet. We talk about everything and she is my lifeline, she does a brilliant job. They have some amazing therapists, like Chrissy, who come and see me too and they help me with all kinds of things from arranging equipment to helping manage my symptoms and making me more comfortable. It's all these people working together that makes St Gemma's so special. It's like they have all been hand-picked, they are brilliant."



The whole team feel like my second family and I could not have coped without them. We should all be thankful to have St Gemma's in our community. They are the best thing since sliced bread!

A lasting legacy

St Gemma's is only here thanks to the dedication and support of people in Leeds for well over four decades. The legacy of that dedication is a Hospice firmly rooted in the community that will continue to care long into the future.

Sister Anne's legacy

Volunteer Stewart Manning added: "I did not know you Sr Anne but you have left a wonderful legacy in St Gemma's Hospice which has inspired a generation of volunteers like myself and will continue to inspire in the future."
