A Reflection from Our Chief Executive

"This summer marks six months since I became Chief Executive of St Gemma's Hospice. It has been a busy and inspiring time, filled with opportunities to meet staff, volunteers, patients, families, and supporters.

I knew St Gemma's by reputation before joining the team, but only when I arrived did I feel the warmth of the welcome and witness first-hand the dedication of everyone here. I've visited all 26 of our charity shops (bringing home a few treasures along the way!), spent time with care teams on the In-Patient Unit and in the community, and joined those supporting bereaved families.

Understanding our wider community has also been important. From supporter events to the annual volunteer thank you lunch, an Iftar gathering, and G-Fest, I've seen how deeply St Gemma's is woven into the life of Leeds and beyond. Listening to people's stories and seeing the many ways they support us has strengthened my appreciation for our community.

I know people valued the connection they had with Kerry, my predecessor, who many had known for over a decade. Building that trust again is important, and I am grateful to everyone who has enabled me to shadow their work and share their time and expertise.

As Chief Executive, I must focus on both today and the future. Demand for our services is growing, the NHS is changing, our buildings need modernising, and parliament is considering legislation on assisted dying, which is not compatible with our charitable objectives. Supporters often tell me how important it is to feel confident that St Gemma's will still be here, providing outstanding care, for many years to come. That is a responsibility I hold close.

A quote I discovered in our history captures this beautifully:

"May those who follow in this great work be of the same calibre as the valiant women... who had the faith and courage to plant the seed."

I return to these words often as we shape the St Gemma's of tomorrow, while carrying forward the compassion and courage of those who came before us.

Above all, we are here to care for those who need us. This is only possible because of you — our supporters. Your generosity of time, donations, and trust keeps our doors open and ensures every patient and family receives the care they deserve. I am deeply grateful. Together, with your support, we can secure St Gemma's for generations to come.

A Front-Row Seat to the Future of Care

At St Gemma's, we're always looking for new ways to improve care — not just for today's patients, but for the doctors and nurses of tomorrow. That's why our own Academic Unit of Palliative Care is embracing innovation in medical education, giving students a front-row seat to the very best in compassionate care.

Medical students have long learned from visiting the Hospice, seeing first-hand what compassionate palliative care looks like. But some experiences are rare or hard to access. To bridge that gap, the Academic Unit has introduced Virtual Clinical Experiences (VCE) — a pioneering platform that is likely a global first for a hospice.

Using smart glasses, cameras, and a digital stethoscope, students join consultations remotely. They see, hear, and interact in real time, then debrief with clinicians afterwards — all without disrupting the patient. Sessions are fully consented, and patients can pause at any time, keeping comfort front and centre.

Piloted with students from the University of Central Lancashire, feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. Patients found the technology non-intrusive, families appreciated the natural interaction, and students valued the opportunity to observe and engage from a distance. It also brings together doctors and nurses in training, fostering collaboration from the very start of their careers.

By removing geographical barriers, VCE allows more students — wherever they are — to gain vital palliative care experience, building the skills, confidence, and empathy they'll need in the future.

Powering care with sunshine

This summer, eco-friendly improvements at St Gemma's are making a real difference — for the Hospice, our gardens, and the planet. Our vegetable patch is thriving, supported by four new water butts collecting rainwater, while flowers, lavender, and colourful blooms boost biodiversity, attracting bees, hoverflies, and other pollinators.

Indoors, our solar panels now frequently power the entire building. This spring, they generated enough electricity to run the whole Hospice for the first time, sometimes even sending extra back to the grid. That helps cut our energy bills meaning your donations go even further to support what matters most: patient care.

With energy-efficient LED lighting and other eco-friendly updates, these small steps are making a big difference — for the planet, our finances, and the people we care for every day.



Hospice Care: It's More Than You Think

Every autumn, hospices across the UK celebrate Hospice Care Week. At St Gemma's, we use the week to shine a spotlight on some of the remarkable ways we support patients and their families — and to challenge myths about what hospice care really is.

Our team works tirelessly to provide care tailored to each patient. But hospice care isn't just about managing pain or symptoms on the ward — it's often about the little things that make life meaningful. It could be enjoying a morning coffee at a favourite café, cheering at a sports match, taking a day trip to the beach, or simply spending time in their own garden. Hospice care is about living well, as much as preparing for the end.

This year's theme, "It's More Than You Think," captures that perfectly. Hospices aren't just places people go at the very end of life — they are hubs of support, innovation, and hope, offering practical help, emotional guidance, and compassionate care for patients and families.

These stories show just how transformative hospice care can be.

Jude said:

"St Gemma's has been a lifeline for me. I'm too poorly to go to a beauty salon, but Helen does my nails, and it makes such a difference – I feel like a different person. She knows exactly how to care for someone in my situation and always makes me comfortable. I've tried Zumba and other activities in Out-Patients, but it's these little touches – Reiki, hand massages, just talking – that really help. Knowing they check in when I'm unwell makes all the difference. I wouldn't go anywhere else."

David said:

"I was given just two days to live in hospital, and my family was preparing for the worst. When I arrived at St Gemma's, I knew it was a special place. It didn't feel clinical at all – more like a hotel, and the team helped me feel better each day. Paul, my St Gemma's community specialist nurse, was like a guardian angel, giving me hope when my GP said there was none. Once my symptoms were under control, I realised I didn't need end-of-life care. I've now been fully discharged and can get my life back, knowing I can always return if needed. The care, compassion, and even the food – it's all amazing."



"A year ago, my life was in chaos – I was seriously ill, struggling with alcohol, had experienced domestic violence and was living in supported accommodation for alcohol-dependent women. St Gemma's truly helped turn my life around. Not just through nursing care – but making me safe and helping with the things that were important to me, like making memories with my children and reconnecting with my adopted son. The whole team gave me the care I didn't even know I needed – they literally gave me my life back. Hospices aren't just about end-of-life care; they give hope. They've helped me to find peace with everything before I die.

Angels exist – and they're at St Gemma's."

Max and Tom's commitment ceremony:

Earlier this year we had the privilege of hosting a heartfelt commitment ceremony for Tom and his partner, Max. Surrounded by loved ones, they exchanged vows and enjoyed an afternoon tea with fizz and cake, lovingly prepared by our Bistro team. Sadly, Tom passed away a few days later, surrounded by those who loved him. Max shared, "Tom received the best possible care from the team at St Gemma's. I will be forever grateful to everyone who helped him and me in his final days." His mum added, "It is a very special place where kindness and expertise meet."

We spoke to Laura, whose 4-year-old daughter took part in last year's Santa Dash.

"St Gemma's Hospice means so very much to me as they cared for my grandma and my mum. I was just 26 and my mum was 53; losing the best person in my whole world at the time was beyond heart-breaking — but St Gemma's made the saddest of times that little bit easier with their outstanding care and support.

My mum loved Christmas, and now I follow in her footsteps to sprinkle magic for my daughter — keeping my mum's spirit in everything I do.

My husband Jon is a keen runner — me not so much. But luckily our little girl, Georgina, has inherited his sporting ability. So, we felt joining the Santa Dash to dress up and raise money in my mum's memory was a fun, festive thing to do.

5k is a long way to run for little legs and as Georgina was only four at the time, it was a big challenge for her. It was incredible to see so many Santas running together and I almost burst with pride when my little Santa made it across the finish line. She was so happy and proud to receive her medal and raise money for other families who need the support of St Gemma's. 16 years after losing her, it was incredibly heart-warming to know that in some way, my mum is still spreading Christmas magic."




Buy your Christmas cards
